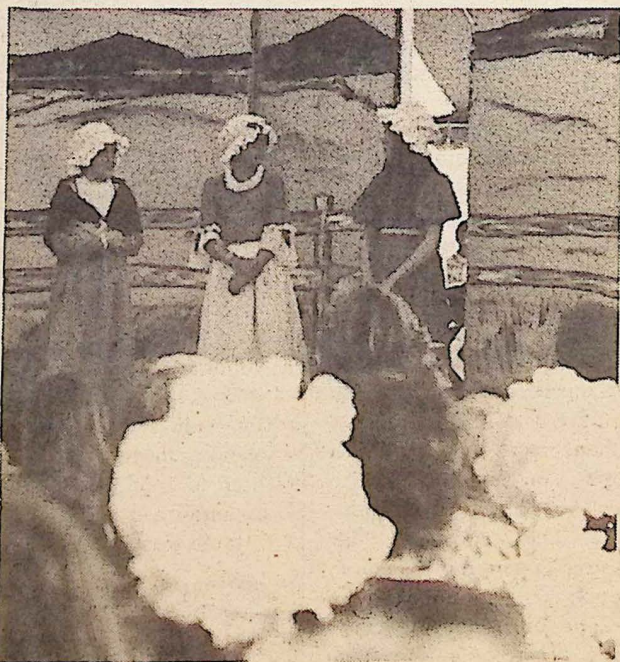

## Results of Osterville cancer drive

The enthusiastic response of the community to Osterville's Village Fair for the benefit of the American Cancer Society will enable the committee to donate a total of \$4,527.50, Mrs. Rosamond Fuller announced this week.

In expressing her appreciation for the support of all who participated, Mrs. Fuller said, "It's just wonderful; everyone has been enthusiastic and pitched right in and gotten it all done."

As Chairman of the Osterville committee, Mrs. Fuller inspired the full-day program which included a Bicentennial Parade, a play starring Osterville's fifth grade, lunch for all comers, and an afternoon of fun for fair-goers.

To publicize the celebration, posters were created by the students of Osterville Elementary School. Winner of the first prize for grades 1-3 was Steven Dumont, and for grades 4-6 was Beth Murphy.

Second prize winner, grades 1-3, was Linda DaLomba; for grades 4-6 the winner was Chris Lazzari. Third prize winner, grades 1-3, was Rosemary Batson, and grades 4-6, Paul McCartin.

First prize for each group was a \$25 bond; second prize, five new \$2 bills; and third prize, five silver dollars.

In the most colorful category, Susan Parke as Raggedy Ann was chosen winner.

Choosing the best costume in the parade proved too much for the judges. As a result, each of the children who marched was given a special ribbon of appreciation.

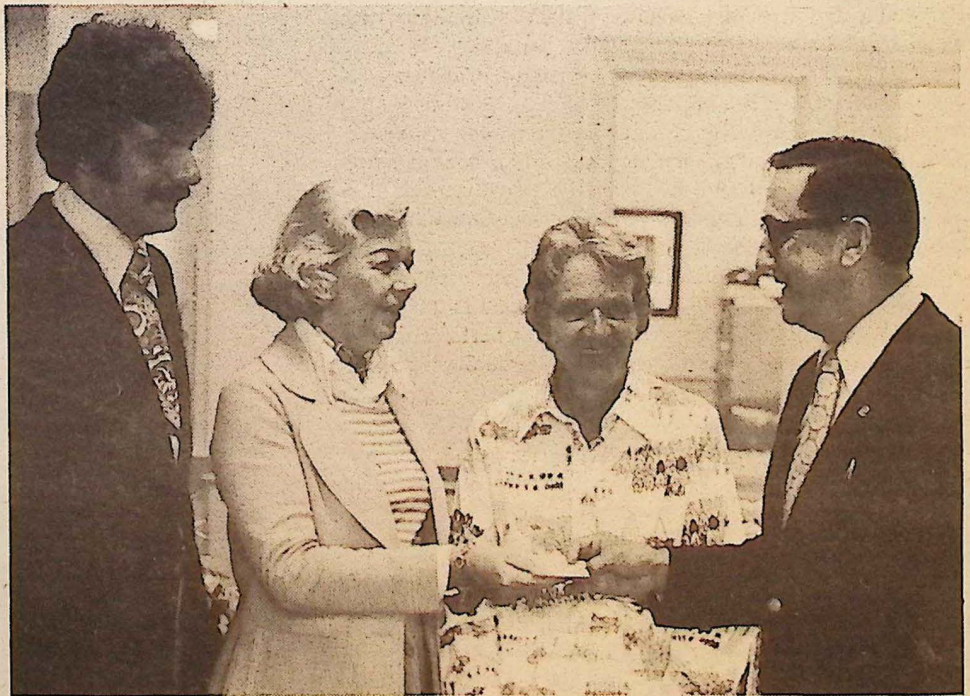
